




#### **Cabinet ToW circular**

- How will this policy respect existing Māori authority, strengthen relationships, and contribute to peace and good order?
- How are Māori leading and contributing to this policy's development, and to establishing the profities it is intended to serve; do Māori say that these arrangements are satisfactory?
- Is this a policy that more appropriately belongs in whole, or in part, to a Māori political community as a expression of rangatiratanga? If not do Māori people say that matters of tionga or specific Māori interest need to be considered and how are Māori experts drafting or otherwise contributing to this policy?
- How will this policy consider the responsibilities, rights and capacities of Māori citizens and ensure equity of outcomes as Māori people define them?
- How will this policy support people to live *as* Māori and according to Māori values and customs?
